First and foremost, it's hurricane season. I realize that many of you are new residents and have not gone through a hurricane. If a storm is approaching or even hints that it could impact South Florida, please, listen to local media and follow us on Facebook and Twitter. We post frequent updates, alerts, notices, warnings and tips to keep you and your family safe. It only takes one storm to destroy a lifetime, that's why we can't stress enough the importance of having a hurricane evacuation plan and following tips from experts. The most exciting event this summer is the opening of our new O.B. Johnson and Austin Hepburn Center complex on Pembroke Road and NW 8th Avenue. The grand opening is set for 10 a.m., Saturday, Sept. 17. Bluesten Park, our



new main Fire Rescue/Emergency Operations Center, the Golden Isles Tennis Center and Golden Isles Park are all advancing.

Summer also means the budget season. City Manager Daniel Rosemond will submit his proposed budget soon. We will comb through the proposal at two workshops

beginning at noon, Wednesday, Aug. 24, and, if necessary, at noon, Thursday, Aug. 25. The meetings will be in the City Commission Chambers. You will get your chance to speak up at two public hearings, on Monday, Sept. 12, at 6 p.m., and again on Thursday, Sept. 22, at 6 p.m. in the City Commission Chambers. I encourage you to come out and get involved in your government; speak

up and help us budget wisely.

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has implemented a new traffic pattern at Hallandale Beach Boulevard at Dixie Highway and First Avenue. FDOT installed a median and closed off the left turn lanes for safety. FDOT requires east bound and west bound drivers to make a series of right turns to travel south on Dixie Highway or north on NE First Avenue. Also, drivers will be ticketed if they make an illegal U-turn after passing through the intersection. It's a safety issue.

We've also made it easier for you to see what construction projects are going on in the City; commercial projects, City projects, public works projects, infrastructure. We've added a new Geographical Information System (GIS) link on our website www.cohb.org, to help you find and monitor projects. Approved projects are posted on a map. Just hover or click on the site and a link will open with the name of the project and the basic details. Click on the photo and the plans for the project open. It's another way we are improving our service to ensure you are informed.

This summer also is the beginning of the election cycle. Early voting runs from Sunday, Aug. 21, through Sunday, Aug. 28, with the primary on Tuesday, Aug. 30. The general election is Tuesday, Nov. 8.

As you can see, Hallandale Beach is very progressive. Thank you for being a City resident, and if you have any questions, we have a talented staff on duty to serve you.



COUNTY CHANGES STROKE TREATMENT PROTOCOL THROUGH EFFORTS OF FIRE RESCUE CHIEF MARK ELLIS

Time is of the essence in treating a stroke patient. One hour is the target time to minimize the debilitating impact on a patient.

Hallandale Beach Interim Fire Chief Mark Ellis is at the forefront of shaving minutes off the time it takes to get vital aid to a stroke patient. A much sought-after stroke treatment advocate, Chief Ellis convinced Broward County leaders to forego political boundaries and put the needs, health and wellbeing of the patient first. He didn't volunteer for this role, but was thrust into it by being at the right place at the right time.

Several year ago, as the new Hallandale Beach EMS Division Chief, Chief Ellis attended a Broward Stroke Council meeting. A speaker recounted how delays caused by political boundaries contributed to the death of her husband. The speaker, who worked at a Broward hospital with a stroke program, recounted how her husband suffered a stroke. She called 9-1-1, then called the stroke center at her hospital. The woman told responding paramedics, the stroke center was on standby for her husband. However, because of policies and political boundaries, the paramedics were required to transport the patient to the nearest hospital. Upon arrival, the woman begged the E-R staff to transfer her husband to the stroke center. Another ambulance was called, and again more red tape; the patient could not be transferred across the City limits. After multiple delays, the patient was finally transferred to the stroke center; it

was hours later. The man died.

That epiphany was the genesis of today's stroke protocol in Broward County. Chief Ellis took this story to the Broward County Regional EMS Council and the EMS Chief's Association. Working with the EMS directors from throughout Broward County, they agreed the needs of the patients trump political boundaries. Policies were changed. Paramedics can now take a stroke victim

to the highest level stroke center, bypassing local hospitals without stroke centers.

Chief Ellis didn't stop at the Council, but went to work with Dr. Brijesh Mehta at Memorial Regional Hospital in Hollywood. Together, they developed a protocol using an advanced pre-hospital triage scorecard, an iPhone app, and "Facetime" to pre-alert the NeuroInterventional doctor and relay the symptoms of the patient. This allows the Stroke Team to activate the Neuro Cath Lab earlier and start the stroke protocol and treatment up to 20 minutes sooner, saving additional

lives and preventing many of the lasting effects suffered by stroke patients.

Innovative, this process has made Chief Ellis a much sought-after speaker throughout the nation on stroke protocols. From California, to the D.C. area, Chief Ellis has spoken with EMS Chiefs, hospitals and stroke associations explaining how working together can save lives.

Tick, tick, tick... Chief Ellis has shortened the critical hour to less than 40 minutes. Lives have been saved, permanent injuries reduced.

DID YOU KNOW: U.S. FLAG DROP OFF POINT



The main fire station, located at 121 S.W. 3 Street, has a mailbox converted into a flag drop off point. FIRE SPRINKLER RETROFIT FOR CONDOS/HIGH RISE BUILDINGS

The current requirement through Florida Statute is for condos to either conduct and register their “opt-out” vote by December 31, 2016 or install a fire sprinkler system by December 31, 2019. The proper method for the vote is outlined in F.S. 718 and MUST be registered prior to the deadline or the fire sprinkler installation is mandatory. Check with your board and request verification

that your vote has been registered through proper channels.

Recently a new issue has been brought to light: whether the vote is to “opt-out” or to install a partial (common area) fire sprinkler system, there is still a requirement for an engineered life safety system evaluation with compliance by December 31, 2019. This **may** include a partial fire sprinkler system, fire alarm

upgrades, smoke control systems, or compartmentation (fire doors for separation). The sections of the Florida Fire Prevention Code that outline the engineered life safety system are available on the City’s website: www.cohb.org.

DON'T LEAVE PETS OR CHILDREN IN CARS

As we enter into the “Dog Days of Summer” it is critical to understand the dangers of children and pets left in vehicles. We all love our children (two



legged and four) and would never think of intentionally exposing them to 125 degrees but that’s how hot the interior of a vehicle can get in a matter of minutes (less than 10) – even with the windows cracked! The majority of cases where a child or pet has been left in the vehicle by a parent or caretaker have been accidental – **it can happen to anyone!** While writing this article an 11 month old baby died after being left in her parent’s vehicle outside their home in Hialeah (5/23/2016).

Contributing factors include a change in the normal daily routine, lack of sleep, stress, fatigue, and distractions – any of those sound familiar? The average number of U.S. child vehicular heat stroke deaths is 37 per year (one every 9 days) with 87% age 3 or under.

SAFETY TIPS: *Never leave children (or pets) alone in or around cars; “Look Before You Lock” – get in the habit of always checking the back seat before locking the vehicle; leave something you’ll need in the back seat like your cell phone, purse, briefcase, etc. so you must go to the back to retrieve; lock your vehicle when parked (driveways, garage, etc.) as a vehicle can become a hiding place for children to play; if you see a child or pet alone in a vehicle get involved – call 9-1-1 immediately.*

The catch phrase “Hurricane Amnesia” is very relatable these days as a decade has passed since Hurricane Wilma hit Broward County. How many of us have updated our emergency kits; checked hurricane shutters or windows; know about “Pet Friendly Shelters”; know your risk and evacuation routes; secure copies of insurance policies, medical records, and precious photos; monitor yard debris and collection dates? **Hurricane Season runs from June 1 through November 30** but preparedness is important every day of the year.

SUMMER SAFETY TIPS

- S** = Sun screen SPF 30 or higher; water resistant; broad-spectrum protection
- A** = Always HYDRATE!! Heat related accidents can sneak up on you – hydrate often.
- F** = Fireworks should be supervised – sparklers burn at over 1,200 degrees
- E** = Emergency kits should be updated – take a C.P.R. course!
- S** = Supervise children at all times – around water, BBQ grills, fireworks, etc.
- U** = Umbrellas at the beach can block some of the sun’s harmful UV rays
- M** = Meals on the grill – use caution when grilling outdoors with children

O.B. JOHNSON/HEPBURN CENTER GRAND OPENING SEPTEMBER 17

For more than 40 years, the Austin Hepburn Center has been a gathering point for the City's residents in need of social services, senior services and medical attention. From children to seniors, the Hepburn Center has been the "go-to" location for those in need of services or friendship.

The Hepburn Center Human Services Department, Oreste B. (O.B.) Johnson Park will be moving into a new 42,000-square-foot multi-generational center. The Grand Opening is scheduled for Saturday, September 17, 2016, from 10: a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The existing Hepburn Center is 15,000 square feet and the OB Johnson Gymnasium and Teen Zone are about 9,000 square feet.

O.B. Johnson Park and the Austin Hepburn Center honor the memories and contributions of a community leader and hero. O.B. Johnson worked with the City to develop the old Dixie Park, the first major park in the Northwest Quadrant. Austin Hepburn was a heroic officer killed in the line of duty.

Funded by the Hallandale Beach Community Redevelopment Agency (HBCRA), the \$14.8 million complex will include expanded social services, senior services and youth services including the After School Program (ASP), Spring and Summer Camps. On the parks side, there will be a new O.B. Johnson Gymnasium and expanded Teen Zone. The complex will include tennis courts, basketball courts, a state-of-the-art playground

and multi-purpose field. The baseball field that was located at the old O.B. Johnson Park will be moved to the new Peter Bluesten Park.

The major focus in the new com-

plex will be continuing to deliver services to the City's residents. Hallandale Beach is unique in the myriad of services offered at the Hepburn Center. The City opened the center in 1974 to serve the needs of seniors, school-aged children and to offer pre-natal care to women in the neighborhood. At the time, this was a joint venture with Broward County only one of two locations in South County for women in the region to get free pre-natal care. Also, it was the only gathering point for seniors. As the need increased, Broward County moved the health clinic, but the Hepburn Center continued as a mecca for social and community services.

While many neighboring communities closed their social services and seeded operations to Broward County, Hallandale Beach has continued to offer specialized services, from childhood to adulthood and seniors, in the Austin Hepburn Center. Three executive directors have stayed the course since the Hepburn Center opened, Mary Washington, Marian McCann-Collee, and the current Human Services Department Director Beverly Sanders.

When the all-purposes social service center was built, then Mayor Milton Weinkle proposed naming the center for Hallandale Beach Police Officer Austin Hepburn, a heroic, decorated officer who lived 25 of his 26 years in the City. Officer Hepburn was killed by three car thieves in 1973; he died one block from his house in the Northwest Quadrant of the City.

The new center will continue to bear his name, continuing the tradition of excellence that Officer Hepburn embodied. The Center offers an extensive After School Program that includes fitness and nutrition, cultural arts and enrichment, skill development and tutoring by licensed teachers, a complete seniors programs with educational and recreational programs to stimulate the minds of older residents, family and individual counseling, USDA food distribution, family emergency assistance programs and many others.

Oreste B. (O.B.) Johnson was a visionary in the Northwest Quadrant. Mr. Johnson was 30 years old when he moved to Hallandale Beach from Fort Lauderdale in 1945 and opened a service station and employment agency.

A former teacher, Mr. Johnson volunteered as a recreation leader in the City. He quickly realized the children in the Northwest section of the City had no safe place to play. The children were playing along the FEC Railroad tracks and in an old tomato patch, which later became Mardi Gras Casino and Race Track.

Mr. Johnson approached City leaders and convinced them to dedicate land at Pembroke Road between NW 8th Avenue and NW 7th Avenue for a park, Dixie Park. The park included a swimming pool and became a gathering point for African Americans in South Florida.

His love of children and recreation lead to his being hired as Recreation Director for Northwest Quadrant activities. In recognition of Mr. Johnson's dedication to the children and residents of the community, the City renamed Dixie Park to O.B. Johnson Park shortly after his death in 1995.

City Utilizes High-Tech to Better Serve Citizens

Hallandale Beach is continuing to modernize with innovative, high-tech improvements to make your government more responsive and easier to reach.

In the past 18 months, we have:

- *Initiated Social Media program to better inform and connect with residents;*
- *LiveStreamed key City meetings via the Internet from remote areas of the City, including the Budget Town Hall Meetings;*
- *Activated online registration to do business with the City;*
- *Instituted a direct-deposit, paperless payment system for vendors;*
- *Deployed a new Citizen Portal to pay utility bills and other City fees online;*
- *Launched an interactive Geographical Information System (GIS) to track public and private development projects; and*
- *Started installing new high-tech, radio-transmitting water meters for residents.*

Our goal is to increase our efficiency, improve your experience in dealing with City government and provide a better level of service.

Our new EnerGov system in Development Services allows online users to monitor the plan review process and read the comments from planners and inspectors. Builders and residents may schedule inspectors online, pay fees online and monitor all phases of the permitting process. This system includes a Code Compliance component that allows property owners to check if there are any violations against a property, or learn how to clean-up any issues.

Our vibrant Social Media strategy includes Facebook, (www.facebook.com/CityOf-HallandaleBeach), Twitter (@MYHBeach), YouTube and the MYHB app, compatible with iPhone and Android devices. Through our Facebook and Twitter pages, you can be the first to see City notices, solicitations, job openings and more. With the MYHB app, you can connect with the City from your mobile device. Ask a question; send us a snapshot of anything you see in the City that needs to be addressed; it's that easy.

Also, we use LiveStream to broadcast events, such as the Budget Town Hall Meetings and give additional opportunities to participate, and stay informed from the comfort of your home or office.

If you want to do business with the City, you must register, provide your federal tax identification number and become certified. In the past, you had to come into City Hall and fill out the forms. Now, just visit the Procurement Department website page, fill out the forms online, attach the required items and get registered. Visit, www.cohb.org/DoBusiness to register.

If you bid and get a contract with the City, we pay our vendors via e-payables. No longer do you have to wait for a paper check, but we pay via e-payables, saving you time and saving the costs of printing and mailing a check.

Also, in the past, the City required utility payments by check or cash. Through the Citizen Portal on the City's website, utility customers can pay their bills online with a debit or credit card eliminating the need for trips to City Hall or to your mailbox.

Our progressive approach streamlining the utilities department as well. We're installing new, high-tech, radio-monitored water meters to increase efficiency. The new, digital meters, are easier to read and help customers identify leaks. The meters can show any anomaly that indicates a spike in water use. The City can notify the resident to ensure they are aware of the increased water flow. This saves you money by catching a leak earlier than in the past.

LPR Cameras Enhance Security

New, high-technology cameras will be installed at the entrances to the Three Islands Safe Neighborhood (TISND) and Golden Isles Safe Neighborhood Districts (GISND) entrances this fall. The new cameras will increase security and surveillance of vehicles at the gated entrances.

Both safe neighborhood districts have cameras that record the license plates of each vehicle entering the Safe Neighborhood District. The GISND cameras also record the faces of pedestrians entering the district. The new high-tech cameras will supplement and replace some of the older cameras with "license plate reader (LPR)" cameras. The LPR cameras will scan each license plate and immediately, record and analyze the data to determine if the car is stolen or if the plate is affixed to the incorrect vehicle.

If there is a "hit" on a vehicle, the system will instantly notify the Hallandale Beach Police Department of the suspicious vehicle, including the license plate and shot of the vehicle.

The two Safe Neighborhood Districts are paying approximately \$457,000 for the cameras through annual assessments imposed to operate the districts. GISND currently has nine cameras located at the guarded entrance. Those nine cameras will be upgraded and the district will add 16 new cameras along the district streets. The new cameras will record on-street pedestrian traffic and include LPR cameras.



New high-technology License Plate Reader (LPR) cameras will be installed at the entrances to the Three Islands Safe Neighborhood (TISND) and Golden Isles Safe Neighborhood Districts (GISND) entrances this fall.



TISND has seven cameras, three at the Atlantic Shores entrance and four at the Three Islands Boulevard entrance that record all license plates. All seven cameras will be replaced with new LPR camera technology.

The cameras in both districts will continue in service until the new LPR reader cameras are installed. Safeware Inc., will install and maintain the cameras. The City hopes to have the new cameras in place by this fall.

HALLANDALE BEACH POLICE EXPLORERS PROGRAM SEEKS NEW RECRUITS

The Hallandale Beach Police Explorers is a volunteer program developed for teens and young adults, 14 through 21 years of age, interested in a law enforcement career. The program teaches and trains policies and procedures, case scenarios, and proper discipline in carrying out duties as actual law enforcement officers. The Explorers also volunteer time in the police department to complete community service hours. Meetings are scheduled every Tuesday evening at 7:00 p.m. at the Police Department, or designated locations throughout the city.

HHS CRIMINAL JUSTICE PROGRAM



The Mission of the Hallandale Beach Police Department Criminal Justice Program is to provide training and education, employment, and community enrichment opportunities to high school students. This program prepares sophomores, juniors, and seniors in Hallandale High for employment as Community Service Aides (CSA) within the Hallandale Beach Police Department. As part of the agency's succession planning strategy, this program introduces civilians to police work, acts as a pipeline for CSA recruitment, and potential officer recruitment. The hiring rate of a typical CSA is approximately \$39K, which is a great starting salary for a high school graduate, without an Associates or Bachelor's degree. Often, after a few years of service, HBPD CSAs become police officers with the agency with a starting salary of approximately \$54K. This career path offers a positive outcome compared to 2011 statistics reported by the Journal of Pediatrics, which show a 41% arrest rate for adolescents by the age of 23.

This program falls under the umbrella of the Broward County Crime Commission's program "Criminal Justice High School and Middle School Academic Education." The training provides a thorough understanding of the operations of the police department through the efforts of a full-time officer who engages with the students. The average American is unaware of the workings of the criminal justice system; and this program aims to fill this knowledge gap at a critical age for adolescents, emerging from their education and into employment opportunities. As Hallandale High program participants learn about the law, ethics, and first aid, they become a beacon within the community for justice and fairness.

Following the tenets in President Obama's "Task Force for 21st Century Policing Report, A Blueprint for Improved Community Policing," Hallandale Beach Police Department continues the Criminal Justice program at Hallandale High, which was implemented in 2007. Hallandale Beach Police Department embarked on implementing an educational program, hosted by Hallandale High, to train high school students in police work. One of the key strategies of this program is to build and enhance trust between law enforcement and the residents of Hallandale Beach, while enhancing public safety.

The three-year educational program complies with the certification by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE), Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission (CJSTC). The program content covers the criminal justice system, state and federal court systems, trial procedures, and constitutional law. Taught by one of Hallandale Beach's Police

officers, the students are exposed to a myriad of police work topics including patrol and traffic control procedures, defensive tactics and physical proficiency skills, and first aid. This program focuses on broad, transferable skills and stresses understanding of strategic elements of police work in the realm of public service: community relations; health, safety and environmental issues.

The program offers classroom, shop, and laboratory activities which include instruction in the use of safety procedures, tools, equipment, materials, and processes found in the industry. Standard police equipment and supplies are provided to enhance hands-on experiences for students in the chosen occupation. Field and laboratory activities include basic procedures in traffic control, patrol, search and arrest, stop and frisk, mock trial, jail operations, crime prevention, fingerprinting, forensic photography, and crime laboratory examination procedures.

Crime Prevention Tips

Summer is here and this is a busy time of the year for families to travel and take a well deserved vacation! We at the Hallandale Beach Police Department want to provide you with tips to help protect your house from being burglarized while you're away. Here are tips to potentially reduce your chance of becoming a victim of a residential burglary while you are away.

1. Have a friend or trusted neighbor pick up your mail and/or collect any newspapers or brochures in your yard or on the front porch.
2. Leave a few lights on, or on timers, in the house and on the outside so it appears that someone is home.
3. Do not leave any messages on your answering machines letting people know you are out of town.
4. Make sure you give your yard and landscaping a fresh cut and trim, so the grass does not grow excessively while you are gone. Poor yard maintenance is a good sign that the house is vacant.
5. If you don't have an extra vehicle to park in your driveway, allow and encourage neighbors to do so. Also have neighbors periodically check your residence.
6. Mark expensive items or sentimental valuables with a marking or number. Put a detailed description of items on a brochure or in a folder to include; model, make, serial number, any distinctive logos or stickers, color and size. This information will help Police enter your items quickly into our database to speed up the process of investigating the incident. Take photos of your property, which is also good for insurance purposes. Markings to use include; initials, partial drivers license number, partial social security number, or even part of a telephone number.
7. The more help you can provide the Detective, the more they can help you and hopefully solve your case and get your property back. We need at least the model, make, and serial number to have a chance to recover your property.

The Hallandale Beach Police Department offers residential security checks to our residents for free, in an attempt to reduce residential burglaries. Call Sergeant Martinez at 954-457-1400 to schedule a residential security check.

Hallandale Beach Boulevard Improvements to Increase Roadway Safety for Drivers

To improve roadway safety, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has eliminated left turns for eastbound and westbound drivers on Hallandale Beach Boulevard at Dixie Highway and SE/NE First Avenue. FDOT completed the work on June 20.

The change means drivers on westbound Hallandale Beach Boulevard who wish to go south on Dixie Highway should turn right on NW First Avenue, then right on NW First Street and right onto Dixie Highway to proceed south. As an alternate, drivers could continue west to the traffic light at SW Fourth Avenue, turn left onto SW Fourth Avenue and navigate back to Dixie Highway. Eastbound drivers wishing to turn north on NE First Avenue should cross the railroad tracks and turn right on SE Second Avenue, then right on SE First Street and right on SE First Avenue to go north.

"It's a safety issue," said Jonathan Overton, FDOT traffic engineer. FDOT has been considering a change to the traffic pattern for years. "All Aboard Florida (AAF) is really what pushed it over the top."

In the old intersection, the railroad crossing gates left about a nine-foot gap in the middle of the road when the gates were down. This allowed some drivers to drive around the gates putting their lives and the lives of others in danger.

"The crossing had to be safed up," Mr. Overton said. When AAF rebuilt the railroad crossing in March, a raised median was added to increase safety and fill the "gap" created by the crossing gates.

Remembering a HERO: Austin Hepburn, Jr.

Hero, son, brother; Austin Hepburn Jr., was only 26 when he was gunned down trying to stop a vehicle theft in July 1973. The son of The Rev. and Mrs. Austin Hepburn Sr., Officer Hepburn immediately distinguished himself on the Hallandale Beach Police. He was cited for bravery in 1972 for thwarting the armed robbery of a lighting store and apprehending four suspects.

Officer Hepburn was considered a native son in the Northwest Quadrant. He was a one-year-old when his parents immigrated to the United States from the Bahamas in 1948. The Rev. and Mrs. Hepburn set down roots and the family had an immediate impact. The Hepburns are credited with building several churches in the area.

The Northwest Quadrant was Officer Hepburn's home. He grew up there, lived there, patrolled there and defended the area. His sister, Katherine Hepburn McPherson, still lives in the neighborhood, not far

from where Officer Hepburn was gunned down on July 27, 1973 by three teenagers in a stolen car. He was shot as he attempted to arrest the youths. Two of the three were arrested within two hours, the third suspect, the gunman, was apprehended in Waycross, Ga.

As a tribute to Officer Hepburn, his dedication and devotion to the community, the City honored him by naming the Social Services Center, the Austin Hepburn Center. It was blocks from where he lived; blocks from where he gave his life.


FLOOD HAZARD INFORMATION AND PROTECTION

Flooding is serious business and the City of Hallandale Beach is working to help you protect your land and belongings. The City offers several services to help you identify your flooding potential and raise awareness to potential problems.

Your home or property may not be near a canal or body of water, but you could still be at risk. Call 954-457-1620 to learn:

- *In which flood zone your property is located*
- *If your property is subject to special flood-related hazards, such as coastal erosion*
- *If your property is located in an area that has previously had flooding problems*
- *If your property is located near an area that should be protected because of its natural floodplain functions*

Be proactive in protecting your property. In Florida, often, when it rains in floods. Insurance can help minimize the financial impact. Visit the website www.FloodSmart.gov or call (888) 379-9531 to find a flood insurance agent, or call the City at 954-457-1620 for information about flood insurance to protect your building and/or your contents. If you rent or



lease your home, the contents should be protected with a flood insurance policy.

To help you plan ahead, City staff members are available to provide property protection consultations including site visits and drainage evaluations. Call 954-457-1386 for property protection advice.

REPORT ILLEGAL DUMPING

I see people dumping their used oil into storm drains all the time. What can I do?

Dumping used oil into the storm drain system is illegal. One gallon of motor oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of drinking water. To report the problem, call (954) 519-1499. Emergency Notifications

The City of Hallandale Beach and Broward County depend on the National Weather Service (NWS) for flood notification. The NWS issues flood advisories prior to expected heavy rainfall that could cause flooding. The City has a citywide flood warning plan to provide early warning to neighborhoods that might experience exceptional flooding. Broadcast methods of emergency notices include the City of Hallandale Beach Radio Station 1620 AM WQFQ and HB TV Channel 78 on Comcast Government Access Channel. Channel 78 will be utilized during emergencies to provide up-to-date information including shelter openings, emergency phone numbers, sandbag distribution, water distribution sites, and more. **During emergencies, the City will publish the latest information on its website, www.cohb.org.**

The CodeRED Emergency Notification System allows the City to notify any geographical area, or any predetermined "target buildings" via telephone, of an impending emergency. All residents and businesses must keep the City informed of current telephone numbers for the CodeRED System by registering online or by contacting the Fire Department at 954-457-1470.

Hallandale Beach City Marina offers annual and transient boat dockage as well as pumpout facilities to the boaters in the Hallandale Beach area. The secure facility is adjacent to the Three Islands Fire Station and is the most southern dockage and pumpout facility in Broward County.

Located on the Three Islands Waterway, the City Marina is home to twenty-six premium slips for annual lease, three premium transient slips, pumpout facilities, and park amenities.

The marina is conveniently located just west of the Three Islands Boulevard Bridge, a fixed-span structure with a mean water level clearance of 17 feet. Ces halem
